SHARES Progress Report

SHARES went live with new member enrollments on November 1, 2015. Here are some statistics you may find interesting:

- In addition to the 44,425 members we uploaded from MACSIS into SHARES, we have enrolled this many new members in Franklin county:

November: 1,151

December: 1,239

January: 1,067

February: 1,262

March: 1,401

April: 1,902

- There were 869 Service Requests submitted since we went live!

Claims Testing Updates

Claims testing has been vigorously under way. We have received several test claims from various agencies (thank you!) and we continue to perform Tier 1 and Tier 2 testing as we receive new claims files. If you still haven't yet submitted an 837 test file, please do so soon. [If you are not using 837's and plan to use Simple Claims, then you do not need to submit a test file.](#)

We will inform everyone when it is time to start submitting live claims through SHARES.
